Whether you want to plant a garden or just improve curb appeal, getting to know the outside space at your new home is an important first step and can save you money, time and effort.

WHAT DO YOU WANT?

Take the time to consider the purpose or use for your outdoor space.

- Area to sit and relax
- More privacy
- An edible garden
- Seasonal color
- Flowers
- Space for your pet(s) to play
- Shade or sun
- Low maintenance
- Increase animal habitat

Don't forget to think about the constraints of your space.

- Are there any special environmental conditions—soil, climate, rain
- Physical barriers/obstacles
- Public ordinances—water or planting restrictions
- Cost/affordability
- Physical needs of people using your outdoor space

GET TO KNOW YOUR OUTDOOR SPACE

- Make a sketch of your property including structures, current plantings and other landscape features
- Record sun exposure to each side of the house
- Note areas where water pools or is slow to drain.
- Notice areas not reached by irrigation
- What have your neighbors planted? Do they have pets?

This information will help guide you in making landscaping decisions.



To make an informed decision whether to keep existing plants, a good place to start is identifying what you have. You don't have to be a botanist or an experienced gardener to identify your outdoor plants. There are many resources available. To the left is a list of plant identification apps that can help you get started. If you find you need expert advice, there are resources for that, too. Some apps provide additional guidance, or you can check with your local County Extension office and/or website.
